

REACH OUT TO KIRIBATI CHALLENGE

Guides around the world share the same Promise and values of friendship, service, and leadership. This challenge helps girls learn about Guiding in Kiribati (pronounced Kiri-bas) and the Pacific region, and how Australian Guides can support their Guiding sisters.

There are three Guide Districts in Kiribati. Two are on Tarawa and one on Kiritimati, which is about 3300km away across the Pacific Ocean. The next closest Guides are in Fiji, more than 2000km away from Tarawa, so they rarely have the chance to meet other Guides like we can at Region camps or Jamborees.

Tarawa and Kiritimati are large coral atolls, that sit very low above the ocean, mostly about one meter above sea level.

Guides in Kiribati often use photocopies of the Pacific Guiding Handbook. The handbook and the challenge activities are written in English which is not their first language. Girls in Kiribati learn some English at school, but many speak their own language at home.

Because they live so far from other Guide groups, they do not have easy access to Guiding resources. There is no Guide Shop where they can buy badges when they complete challenges and local women sew the Guide uniforms when they can source the material. Many children do not wear shoes either, so it is a different lifestyle to ours in Australia.

Guides in Australia can help our Guiding sisters in Kiribati have access to some of the things we often take for granted.

We are raising funds to help make their dreams possible by:

- translating and printing the Guiding handbook and challenge activities into their language
- providing Guiding resources that girls can easily understand

- supplying blank badges that local women can embroider when girls earn a challenge
- supporting Leaders to learn new ways to make Guiding meaningful and relevant for their girls
- providing a Promise Badge for every Member

By purchasing the Reach Out to Kiribati fundraising badge, you will be helping your Guiding sisters in Kiribati.

In these pages you will also find some challenges to help girls learn more about Guiding and life in the Pacific, including Kiribati. There is also an opportunity to share your Guiding experiences with them.

It would be wonderful if each Unit could purchase badges for all the girls so they can show their support for their Guiding sisters.












Badges can also be sold to family and friends to highlight **Girl Guides Australia's service project – reaching out in friendship to Kiribati.**

Complete activities from each section, or challenge yourself to complete several from all sections.

SUPPORTING GUIDING IN KIRIBATI

In late September, a small team of experienced Australian Guiding Trainers and Leaders will travel to Kiribati via Fiji to work with local Leaders. The aim of this visit is to support leadership development and strengthen Guiding for girls and young women to have a voice in their communities.

It has been approximately 15 years since Leaders in Kiribati have had access to formal Guiding training. Leaders have expressed a strong desire to develop their skills so they can confidently deliver the Guiding program for girls in Kiribati.

Around 15 years ago, the Pacific Guiding Handbook was developed. While it has been valuable, some challenges remain. These include:

- the handbook being written in English rather than the local language, so is not as useful as it could be
- limited access to badges to recognise girls' achievements
- some challenges are not always relevant to the local context

This project aims to work in partnership with local Leaders to adapt resources, strengthen training, and support sustainable Guiding in Kiribati.

HOW TO MAKE A HEAD GARLAND

Attach flowers and leaves to a headband to create a head garland. You can use a mix of fresh or artificial flowers and leaves.

The headband can be made from ribbon, raffia, or other suitable materials. Flowers and leaves can be glued, tied, or woven into the band.





The finished garland sits on top of the head like a crown, similar to those worn in Pacific Island cultures, including Kiribati and the Cook Islands, as a sign of welcome and celebration.

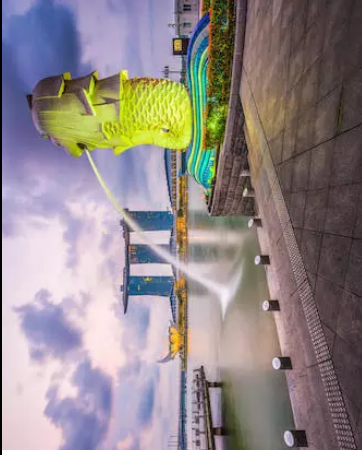
